

Online Appendix. Significant event analysis student instructions

Essay Prompt: Students are required to write two significant event analysis (SEA, critical incident report) reflections during the course of the experience. Choose an event from your immersion experience. The event may be positive, negative, surprising, complex, uncomfortable, uncertain, personally or professionally challenging, or some other moving event in which you directly participated or observed. There is no right or wrong type of event to include in the SEA. Each essay should at minimum address the following:

- Introduction and Background:
 - Describe what happened, where and when, who was involved (de-identified), and how you were involved.
 - What made the event significant to you?
- Evaluation
 - What were your thoughts and feelings? How did they affect your actions at the time of the event?
 - If this event involved others, what were their responses? If not known, what do you think these might have been? How did their choices and behaviors impact you?
- Analysis
 - What practice concerns/challenges were identified?
- Discussion
 - What have you learned about yourself and/or about relationships with others?
- Conclusion
 - How might this impact your role as a future health care practitioner?

Essay Requirements and Formatting Guidelines:

- Reflection to be written in sections outlined above. Spelling and grammar do matter!
- Reflection to be completely de-identified including but not limited to student name, site name, preceptor name, patient name/date of birth, and names of other health care providers.
- The essay should be no longer than 1000 words

Students should include experience type (community, health system, inpatient clinical, ambulatory care) and self-categorize their SEA. Please include one or more of the following categories: self (e.g. describing yourself as a provider); patient care (e.g. communication, health literacy, cultural awareness, etc); health care team (e.g. interactions with other members of the health care team); and health system (e.g. broader things affected by the health care system).
